Jerome Greene Hall is located on the northeast corner of Amsterdam Avenue and West 116th Street in Manhattan. The entrance is on 116th Street.

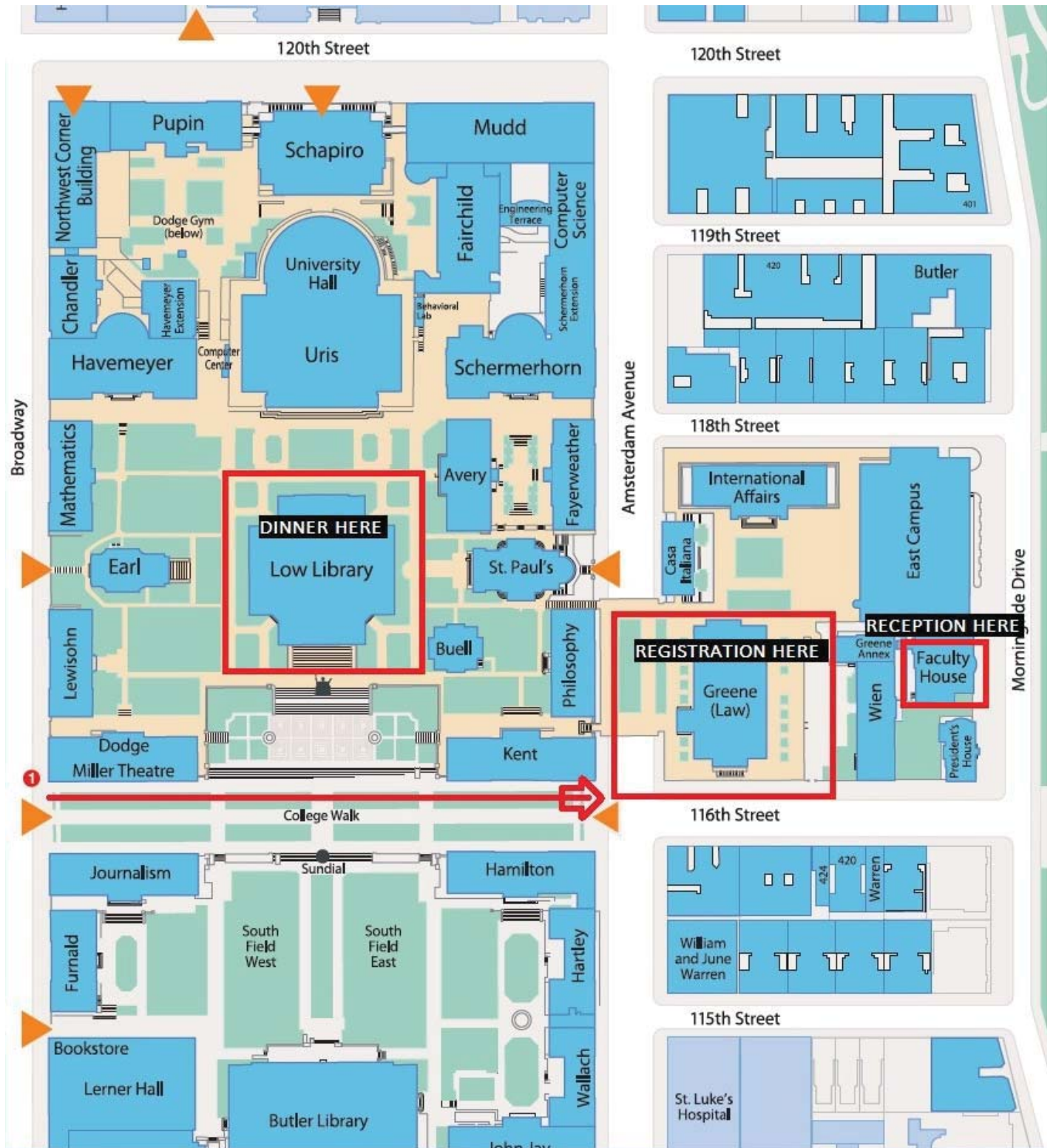


Conference Dinner

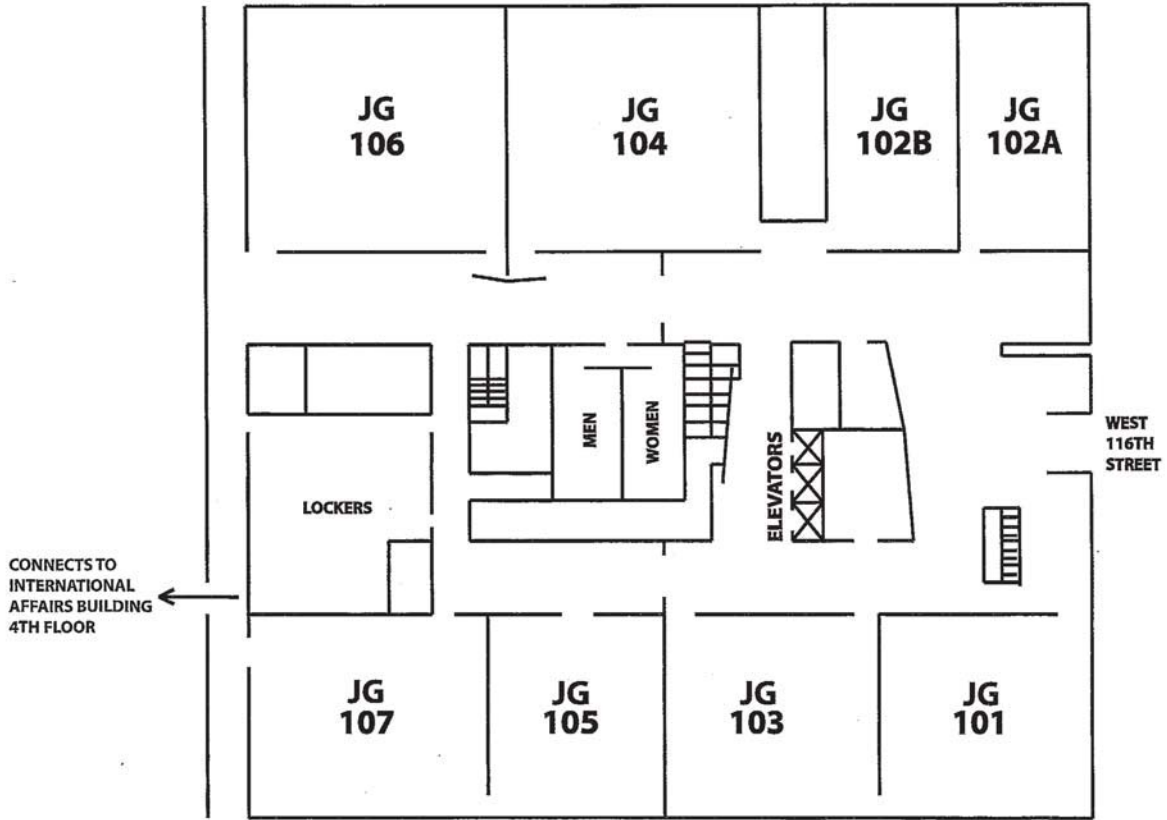

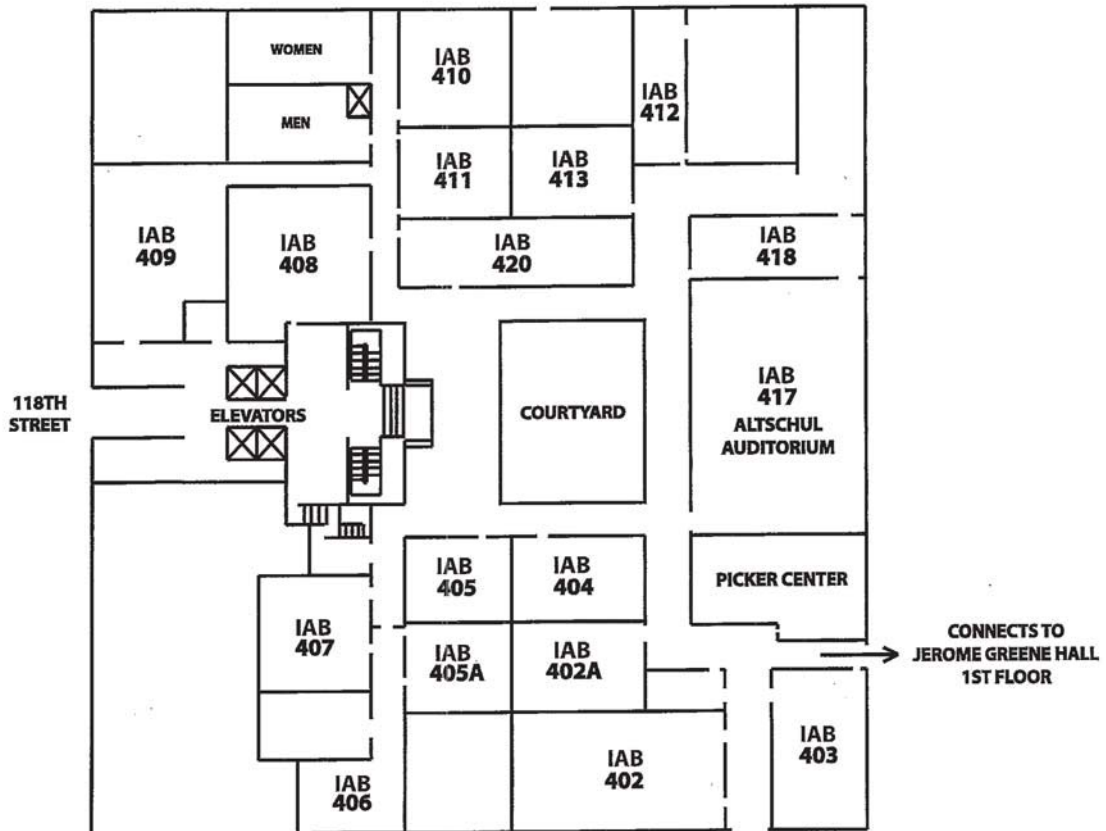

INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS BUILDING - 4TH FLOOR

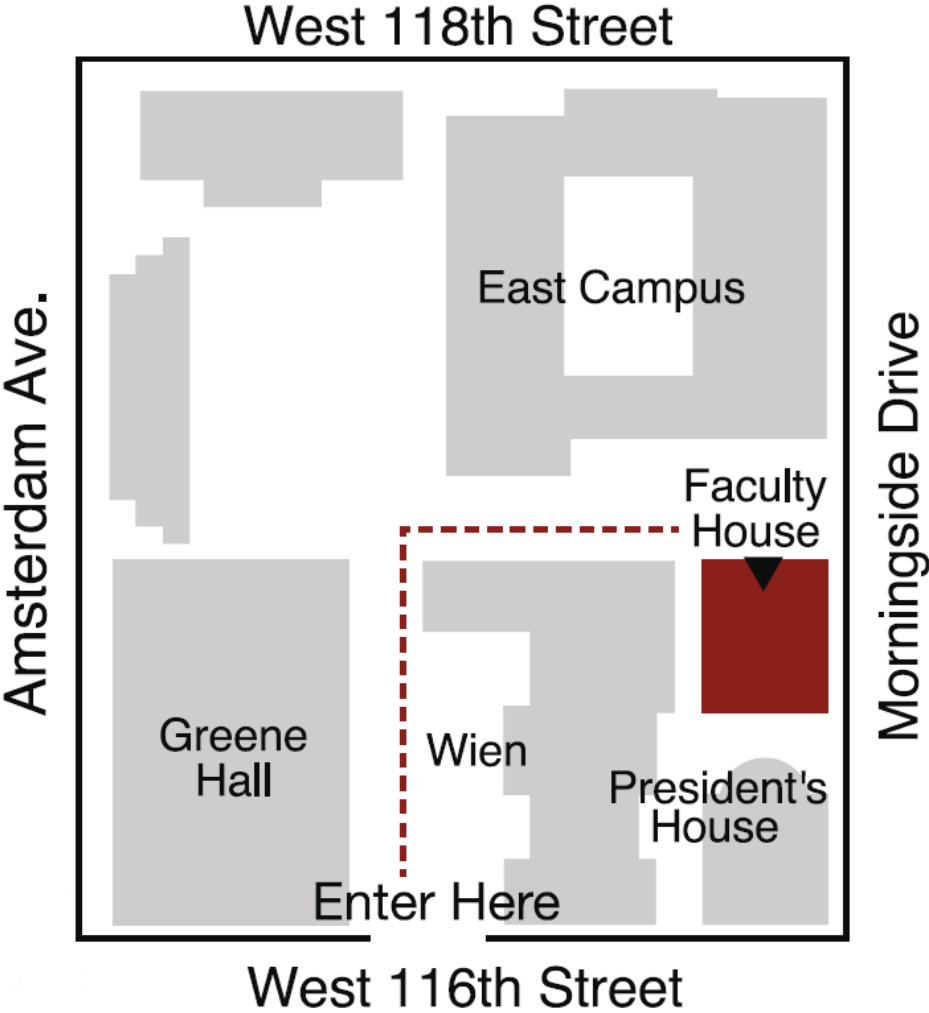


Reception
